



CHARGING AND REMISSIONS POLICY

Introduction

The staff and governors of Orchard Park Community Primary School believe that children benefit from experiencing education in a wide number of forms. To achieve this, the school may arrange for pupils to make visits out of school or to invite visitors to give presentations. In addition, some curriculum activities may involve specific and additional expense to the school.

Aim

The aim of this policy is to set out what charges will be levied for activities, what remissions will be implemented and the circumstances under which voluntary contributions will be requested from parents.

Responsibilities

The Governing Body of Orchard Park Community Primary is responsible for determining the content of the policy and the Head teacher for implementation. Any determinations with respect to individual parents will be considered jointly by the Head teacher and Governing Body.

The Governing Body recognises the valuable contribution that the wide range of additional activities, including clubs, practical activities, trips and residential experiences can make towards pupils' personal and social education. The Governing Body aims to promote and provide such activities both as part of a broad and balanced curriculum for the pupils of the school and as additional optional activities. The governors endorse the guiding principles contained in the Education Act of 1996, in particular that no child should have his/her access to the curriculum limited by charges. If a particular activity is limited to a specific number of pupils, the inclusion of pupils must not make reference to the ability or willingness to pay on behalf of the parent.

Our Mission Statement

A place where children are empowered to reach their full potential, with the highest possible aspirations and passion for learning. With values and respect, our children are confident to move from our nurturing environment to explore and succeed in the wider world.

Prohibition of Charges

The Governing Body of the School recognise that the legislation prohibits charges for the following:

- Education provided during school hours (including the supply of any materials, books, instruments or other equipment);
- Education provided outside school hours if it is part of the National Curriculum, or part of a syllabus for a prescribed public examination that the pupil is being prepared for at the school, or part of religious education;
- Tuition for pupils learning to play musical instruments if the tuition is required as part of the National Curriculum, or part of a syllabus for a prescribed public examination that the pupil is being prepared for at the school, or part of religious education;
- Entry for a prescribed public examination, if the pupil has been prepared for it at the school; examination re-sit(s) if the pupil is being prepared for the re-sit(s) at the school;
- Education provided on any trip that takes place during school hours;
- Education provided on any trip that takes place outside school hours if it is part of the National Curriculum, or part of a syllabus for a prescribed public examination that the pupil is being prepared for at the school, or part of religious education;
- Supply teachers to cover for those teachers who are absent from school accompanying pupils on a residential trip;
- Transporting registered pupils to or from the school premises, where the local education authority has a statutory obligation to provide transport;
- Transporting registered pupils to other premises where the governing body or local education authority has arranged for pupils to be educated;
- Transport that enables a pupil to meet an examination requirement when he has been prepared for that examination at the school;
- Transport provided in connection with an educational trip.

Charges

The Governing Body reserves the right to make a charge in the following circumstances for activities organised by the school.

- Activities outside school hours including clubs
- The full cost to each pupil of any activities deemed to be optional extras taking place outside school hours including residential visits, museum trips, musical events, visits to or from a theatre group.
- Individual/Group Instrumental Tuition outside of that provided through the Wider Opportunities schemes. In such cases the charge will not exceed the cost of provision. Children in Care who wish to have instrumental tuition are entitled to free tuition.
- Breakages
- Additional hours beyond the free allocated 15 hours for 3/4 year olds.

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Residential Visits

A charge will be made (not to exceed the actual costs) for board and lodging on residential visits whether inside or outside school hours. Board and lodgings are deemed to include all elements of food and accommodation.

Music Tuition

Instrumental music lessons. A charge may be made for instrumental music tuition provided either to individuals or to a group of any size unless the tuition forms part of the syllabus for a prescribed public examination or is part of the National Curriculum or the syllabus for religious education. No charge may be made in respect of a pupil who is looked after by the local authority. Pupils eligible for pupil premium may request financial assistance for music tuition.

Breakages

In cases of wilful or malicious damage to equipment or breakages, or loss of school books or equipment on loan to pupils the Headteacher in consultation with the Chair of the Governing Body may decide to make a charge. Each incident will be dealt with on its own merit and at their discretion.

Clothing

The uniform list provide the maximum flexibility to parents as to where they can purchase uniform items and regarding style in order for parents to obtain best value. The school often has a stock of outgrown items which parents may have free of charge. The school will supply essential protective clothing when necessary e.g. safety goggles.

Swimming

The school organises swimming lessons for children in Key Stage 2. These take place in school time and are part of the National Curriculum. We make no charge for this activity. We inform parents and carers when these lessons are to take place and we seek the written permission of parents or carers for their children to take part.

Voluntary Contributions

The Governing Body may ask parents for a voluntary contribution towards the cost of any activity that takes place during school hours. Parents are under no obligation to make any contribution and pupils of parents who are unable or unwilling to contribute will not be discriminated against. In the event of insufficient voluntary contributions being made the activity may have to be cancelled and refunds will be given. In certain circumstances, if trips are deemed to be educationally essential, at the Head teacher's discretion, the school will make up any shortfall in parental contributions.

Parents may also be invited to make a voluntary contribution for the following:

- Educational visits which take place outside school hours

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- Any activity which takes place during school hours;

The terms of any request made to parents will specify that the request is for a voluntary contribution and in no way represents a charge. In addition the following will be made clear to parents:

- a) That the contribution is genuinely voluntary and a parent is under no obligation to pay; and
- b) That registered pupils at the school will not be treated differently according to whether or not their parents have made any contribution in response to the request.

The responsibility for determining the level of voluntary contribution is delegated to the Head Teacher.

Additional Nursery Hours

In line with Cambridgeshire County Council Policy, Orchard Park Primary School is able to offer spare nursery places to children who already access their free 15 hours entitlement and are seeking additional hours within our setting. The school reserves the right to review provision in light of changing circumstances. These places are offered under the following conditions:

1. Priority will always be given to children attending using their free 15 hours entitlement or their 30 hours extended entitlement.
2. Spare places will be offered on a term by term basis once funded places have been allocated.
3. Additional hours will always be offered on a first come first served basis unless the child has identified special educational needs.
4. The number of spare places available will depend on the uptake of funded places and will therefore vary term by term.
5. At the end of every term, school and parents will renew their contract for the following academic term.
6. Additional places will be charged at the agreed rate per session.
7. The number of sessions and given days may vary. This must be agreed between parents and school at the start of each term.
8. Sessions cannot be offered on an ad hoc basis.
9. When paid sessions are missed due to illness, the session will roll into the following week/fortnight/month.
10. Sessions will be paid for via the Agora online system in agreed weekly blocks.
11. Parents can pay in fortnightly or monthly blocks, if this is more convenient.
12. School will not be able to offer refunds.
13. Payments must be paid in advance. If fees are overdue, arrangements must be made to clear arrears.
14. If your account falls into arrears, the school reserves the right to withdraw from the agreement with one week's notice.

Remissions

Children whose parents are in receipt of certain support payments will, in addition to having a free school lunch entitlement, also be entitled to the remission of charges for:

- 50% of costs during residential school trips where these take place wholly or mainly during school hours and where a trip takes place outside school hours but is necessary as part of the National Curriculum or the syllabus for religious education.
- 50% of costs for educational activities that take place off school site but are necessary as part of the National Curriculum.

The determination on a remission of charges is made on the basis of whether the family is eligible for support at the time the child is engaged on the activity.

The school is very keen that all pupils take part in activities arranged for them. It takes the view that, in addition to the required remissions, financial support can be arranged where genuine hardship occurs. On residential visits, the Headteacher will consult with parents who request support and, in confidence, agree the level of payment by the parent and the level of funding by the school from other sources.

Publication of Information

This policy can be found on the school's website and hard copies are available from Main Reception for parents to view.

Review and amendments

This policy will be reviewed annually by the Resources Committee who may, from time to time recommend amendments to the categories for which a charge maybe made, this will be brought to the full Governing Body for ratification. However, the Governing Body reserve the right to review the Charging and Remissions Policy as necessary.
